All our work through the Pupil Premium will be aimed at accelerating progress and overcoming barriers to learning so that these pupils achieve similar outcomes to their peers and diminish the difference between Pupil Premium and non – Pupil Premium both within school and nationally. It is our desire that no pupil is left behind and we use our pupil premium funding effectively to achieve this.
